"Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him." Acts 11:1-2

As believers in Christ Jesus and interpreters of the scriptures, we often make the mistake of acting as if change and conflict were somehow much easier for the early church than they are for us. With two thousand years of church history behind us, the conflict between Christians of Jewish origin and Christians of Gentile origin has long disappeared from our living memory. To most of us, circumcision has become a private medical decision, not a mark of our relationship with God, and if we know someone who keeps kosher dietary laws, they are the exception among Christians, not the norm. Because it was not our conflict, nor were they our longstanding cultural beliefs that were being challenged, most of us assume that this particular theological, biblical and cultural conflict recorded in the book of Acts and in several of the New Testament letters could not have been nearly as bad as the theological, biblical and cultural conflicts that we are both enduring and in many cases participating in.

When we scratch just below the surface of the scriptures, these assumptions are deeply challenged. Brethren often speak of Peter's transformational experience recorded in Acts 10 as an example of the Holy Spirit overcoming resistance to change. We also frequently refer to Acts 15 as the foundational scripture for Annual Conference, District Conference and our congregational council meetings, where the members of the church come together to discern the direction that God is leading us, ideally through prayer, Bible Study and deep listening to one another. We forget that change was not particularly smooth for the early church, nor for Peter as an individual.

After his transformative vision and experience at Cornelius's house, Peter had to go back home to Jerusalem. And when he went home, he had to explain to his fellow believers, many of whom had been formed by centuries of Jewish teaching backed by the words of the Law and the prophets that called for ritual and social separation from Gentiles as a mark of holiness that this new thing was from God. To eat with Gentiles was to participate in their sins in the understanding of the Christians of Jewish origin in Jerusalem. So when Peter got back home to his own people, they criticized him and demanded an explanation. The book of Acts tells us that Peter took them step by step through his vision, through the coincidences that the Holy Spirit arranged, through his preaching and the response of Cornelius's household. By the end of Acts 11, these persons praised God saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life." But lest we think this was it for Peter, in Galatians 2, he records that Peter and James had second thoughts about their decision in Acts 15, and pulled back from full fellowship with the Gentiles (Galatians 2:11-14).

I write these reflections regarding the scriptures because Annual Conference will take up a query this summer regarding the church's response to those in same-sex relationships. This is a subject that has led to a great deal of conflict and division in the church, one that I suspect that each of us has a position on, whether or not we are able to put our perspective into words. I have also heard folks whose personal perspectives on this subject run the gambit of positions express weariness, frustration and a sense that this continued argument is keeping the church from fulfilling its mission. With this in mind, I leave you with my counsel as your District Executive Minister regarding Annual Conference this summer. First, regardless of your perspective on this or any other question the church might consider, it is important to be represented. Those who choose to participate will be the ones who make discernments for the whole body of Christ. The scripture tells us that Peter showed up, even though he did not really want to go to Cornelius's house (Acts 10:9-23). Second, for those who participate in Annual Conference, whether as a delegate or non-delegate, whether online or in-person, prayerfully prepare yourself to both listen and speak. The scripture records that both Peter and the believers of Jewish origin listened, even when what they were hearing contradicted beliefs that they held very dear. And finally, whatever the outcomes of the Annual Conference, prayerfully prepare yourselves to speak honestly about what happened, both to those who will like what happened and to those who will not. Peter did not hide what happened at Cornelius's house from those who would not like it, nor did Paul let Peter and James off the hook. I pray that we too would trust God enough to show up for God and for one another, to listen and to speak, and to honestly and patiently continue in relationship with one another. Daniel L Rudy
